examines the role that authorship plays in people's experience of language and art as meaningful human artifacts. Paleopoetics maps the selective processes that originally shaped the human genus millions of years ago and prepared the human brain to play, imagine, empathize, and engage in fictive thought as mediated by language. A manifestation of the "cognitive turn" in the humanities, Paleopoetics calls for a broader, more integrated interpretation of the reading experience, one that restores our connection to the ancient methods of thought production still resonating within us. Speaking with authority on the scientific aspects of cognitive poetics, Collins proposes reading literature using cognitive skills that predate language and writing. These include the brain's capacity to perceive the visible world, store its images, and retrieve them later to form simulated mental events. Long before humans could share stories through speech, they perceived, remembered, and imagined their own inner narratives. Drawing on a wide range of evidence, Collins builds an evolutionary bridge between humans'

development of sensorimotor skills and their achievement of linguistic cognition, bringing current scientific perspective to such issues as the structure of narrative, the distinction between metaphor and metonymy, the relation of rhetoric to poetics, the relevance of performance theory to reading, the difference between orality and writing, and the nature of play and imagination. Nonetheless, there has been very little research that draws on recent cognitive science to examine thought and emotion in this novel. Hogan sets out to expand our understanding of Ulysses, as well as our theoretical comprehension of narrative—and even our views of human cognition. He revises the main narratological accounts of the novel, clarifying the complex nature of narration and style. He extends his cognitive study to encompass the anti-colonial and gender concerns that are so obviously important to Joyce's work. Finally, through a combination of broad overviews and detailed textual analyses, Hogan seeks to make this notoriously difficult book more accessible to non-specialists. PROFESSOR PRESCOTT was one of the first critics in this country to emphasize the similarity between the poetic faculty and the dream-state of the average man. Ten years ago he published a brochure, "Poetry and Dreams," of which the present volume is an expansion but not an improvement. Although his early

booklet was as punctilious as is his recent volume in excluding references to sex in connexion with poetry, it was a simpler, more diverting and less cumbrous performance. "The Poetic Mind" is a sort of anthology of what critics and poets have said concerning the influence of the unconscious life of the poet on his poetic composition. The author contributes very little that is new to the theory that a literary work is largely the result of an unconscious process. He is not misled into thinking that because a large number of manuscripts of famous poets show numerous corrections and interlineations, that therefore a finished poem is entirely a conscious work. Nor does Professor Prescott bore us with trivial discussions about technique of prosody. Though he is inclined to look with favour upon the use of conventional metres, he does not insist upon hairsplitting in the matter of vowels and accents. Moreover, he has the art of making résumés of his views; his illustrations are always apt; in his chapter on "The Poetic Madness and Catharsis" he shows a true insight into the function of poetry, and he is highly entertaining in "The Formation of Imaginary Characters" as he proceeds to read the personalities of the writers in their fictitious creations. He pays due tribute to such true critics of poetry as

Sidney, Wordsworth, Coleridge, Shelley and Poe; and one is glad to see that he recognizes the profundity of Keble, whose views, in "Occasional Papers and Reviews" and especially in "De Poeticæ Vi Medica," are among the most illuminating ever advanced since Aristotle. His familiarity with other literatures than English is limited. For example, on three different occasions he assigns Gautier's "La Morte Amoureuse" to Flaubert, who wrote only three short stories in his life. If asked to list the greatest innovators of modern American poetry, few of us would think to include Jay-Z or Eminem in their number. And yet hip hop is the source of some of the most exciting developments in verse today. The media uproar in response to its controversial lyrical content has obscured hip hop's revolution of poetic craft and experience: Only in rap music can the beat of a song render poetic meter audible, allowing an MC's wordplay to move a club-full of eager listeners. Examining rap history's most memorable lyricists and their inimitable techniques, literary scholar Adam Bradley argues that we must understand rap as poetry or miss the vanguard of poetry today. With care and verve, he explores the mad in the literature of Amiri Baraka, Gayl Jones, and Ntozake Shange; in the jazz repertoires of Buddy Bolden, Sun Ra, and Charles Mingus; in the comedic performances of Richard Pryor and Dave Chappelle; in the protest music of Nina Simone, Lauryn Hill, and Kendrick Lamar, and beyond. These artists activate madness as content, form, aesthetic, strategy, philosophy, and energy in an enduring black radical tradition.
